
Activities for the young—and young at heart!

Jellies Invasion is one of the National Aquarium's most popular exhibits—and for good reason! Jellies are brainless invertebrates and various species are found in most of our planet's aquatic environments, from the nearby brackish waters of the Chesapeake Bay to every ocean!

While some jellies are venomous and can deliver a severe sting—or worse—from cells called nematocysts along their tentacles, other species, like the Aquarium's blue blubber jellies, pose no danger to humans at all. In fact, we're so crazy about jellies, we even grown them from their polyp stage in our culture lab. 
Our Outstanding Octopus

The National Aquarium's giant Pacific octopus habitat can be found in the Surviving Through Adaptation gallery. Octopuses can be found in every ocean on Earth! Giant Pacific octopuses dwell in the shallow and deep waters of the Pacific Ocean, on the western coast of North America up to Alaska and southwest to Japan, as much as 2.500 feet beneath the surface. Other octopuses, such as the Dumbo octopus, are only found in the deepest parts of the ocean, at depths of up to 13,000 feet. The octopus is a mollusk, related to squids and snails. Like squid, the octopus is a **cephalopod**, which comes from the Latin words for head and foot since its feet—or arms in this case—are attached to its head. Its mouth includes a hard **beak**, used to break open tough prey such as crabs and snails, and is located on the underside of its body. It pounces upon prey, enveloping it in its inter-arm webbing. By drawing water into its mantle-the muscular structure that houses the octopus's organs—and rapidly expelling it through a tubelike siphon, an octopus can jet itself backward, away from danger. When cornered, octopuses can emit a thick black ink, which confuses potential predators, giving the octopus a chance to escape. Speaking of disappearing, the octopus is a master of camouflage, instantly changing the color and texture of its skin to blend in with its environment as needed.
